I have included all three together in one paperback volume. The translations in this work were not merely downloaded from public domain sources, pasted together in a document, had a price affixed, and published, as other editors seem to have done. I made a careful decision of where to place the caesura, pause mid-line, artfully between**

syllables, added the mid-line's punctuation and also punctuated the end-of-line in 9,610 lines of epic poetry. I did this to indicate where pauses should occur in reading and vocal performance. I also included a pronunciation guide and internet study links to help teachers and students of the epic. Many modern prose versions of Beowulf don't exhibit the rhythm, fire, and dramatic drive the original listeners experienced. The original orators of the epic performed Beowulf aloud as a spoken word performance and public entertainment. This re-edited version gives more closely the original experience of line pairs with distinctive pauses and rhythmic repetitions of syllable sounds. In the ancient tradition the audience of tribe members enjoyed this entertainment through long winters around wood fires in their dark, smoky longhouses. They heard a cyclical, driving rhythm. I imagine a drumbeat and the plucking of the strings of a lyre helped to draw the listeners out of their daily existences and into the many tales of high adventure of which we now have but a few remaining examples in writing. There was boasting, bragging, aggressive speech, and celebration of the warrior's spirit. It was the pounding rhythm of a warrior society living on the edge every day, living each day as if it could be their last. Here is a preview from the Gummere translation. Grendel the Murderer. It survives in a single manuscript known as the *Nowell Codex*. Its composition by an anonymous Anglo-Saxon poet is dated between the 8th and the early 11th century. In 1731, the manuscript was badly damaged by a fire that swept through a building housing a collection of Medieval manuscripts assembled by Sir Robert Bruce Cotton. The poem's existence for its first seven centuries or so made no impression on writers and scholars, and besides a brief mention in a 1705 catalogue by Humfrey Wanley it was not studied until the end of the eighteenth century, and not published in its entirety until the 1815 edition prepared by the Icelandic-Danish scholar Grímur Jónsson Thorkelin. In the poem, *Beowulf*, a hero of the Geats in Scandinavia, comes to the help of Hroðgar, the king of the Danes, whose mead hall (in Heorot) has been under attack by a monster known as Grendel. After *Beowulf* slays him, Grendel's mother attacks the hall and is then also defeated. Victorious, *Beowulf* goes home to Geatland in Sweden and later becomes king of the Geats. After a period of fifty years has passed, *Beowulf* defeats a dragon, but is fatally wounded in the battle. After his death, his attendants bury him in a tumulus, a burial mound, in Geatland. The numerous different translations and interpretations of *Beowulf* turn this monumental work into a challenge for the reader.
