The volume also provides case-studies of the giallo cycle, rape and revenge dramas, the Italian rogue cop series, post-apocalypse films, barbarian movies, and sex comedy formats. By considering the icons and genres from the golden age of Italian cult film alongside the crucial social and sexual tensions that influenced their creation, this book will be of interest to film scholars and cult movie fans alike.

INTERPRETING MASS CULTURE

Whether recognized or denied, queerness is an approach to mass culture that is shared by people with every kind of sexual self-definition.
